

Why would you want to second someone?

- ► I don't want to be paid in rubles
- Home country employment protection
- I need to stay in my home country social security
- I need to stay in my home country pension plan
- Life assurance
- Credit Rating, Mortgages, Divorce and Alimony
- Host country confidentiality
- Out of sight, out of mind



Why would anyone want to stop you from doing so?

- Control
- Suspicion of tax evasion
 - Income Tax
 - Social Security
 - Profit stripping via secondment fees
- Labour Law issues and administration in Russia
- Absence of any corporate responsibility for the expatriate
- Officers of Russian companies

Is secondment illegal?



Is secondment illegal?

- No it is not illegal. It is actually actively "legal".
- Article 306.7 of the Tax Code
- Letter of FMS 7 February 2003
- Letter of MinTrud 22 August 2003
- Hundreds of court cases
- If you keep saying it is illegal, then people will believe you.
- The problem is interpretative issue with work permits

What are the options? What are the risks?

<u>Approach</u>	Risks
Full Local Employment	None (except no expatriate)
Register PE and use service	Administrative burden.
contract	How many p.e. registrations?
Dual employment with secondment fee	Non-deductibility risk; VAT;
	UST risk; 2 work permits
	– can be finessed
Dual employment with	No deduction, p.e./corp presence
no charge back	risk; 2 work permits
Dual employment with	Significant p.e. risk; withholding;
Service fee	VAT; 2 work permits
